When these are combined with radio and television efforts, it is fair to say that we are doing a better job of making the gospel available around the globe than any previous generation. However, we must never forget the influence of personal contact because the beauty of a Christian life has a reinforcing impact that must never be dismissed. As has been reported earlier, the board of the school (Nigerians) has decided to seek independent university status because the Muslims are pressuring the University of Jos to withdraw our affiliation, which we have with them, that gives local accreditation to the degrees that are granted by our school. If we get an independent university status, they will not be able to withdraw the accreditation status from our graduates. The first major step in that direction is that national education authorities in Nigeria require ownership of 100 hectares (approximately 247 acres) of land before applying to become an independent university. A property has been located and negotiations are underway for it to be purchased. Many of you may have participated in the challenge to let your fifth Sunday contribution in December go toward this purchase...please keep this effort in your prayers and know how grateful those of us who are involved in this work are for your participation (individuals and congregations) in this effort. The response to this appeal has been most encouraging and hopefully this will provide an adequate amount for a down payment. The coming month of June (2024) also has a fifth Sunday and I would encourage congregations and individuals to consider donating their 5th Sunday contributions to this good work. If you are able and willing to do that, please send the funds directly to Savannah Church of Christ, 1175 Pickwick Street, Savannah, TN 38372, which oversees this effort. We now have graduates working in at least 12 different African nations and continue to get very encouraging reports of the work that is being accomplished by our graduates. The African continent is home for a population that needs to hear the Good News and we can't tell you too often how grateful we are for your help as we seek to train workers for the kingdom in Africa. **Randy Baker**

A WINTER DAY

While planning to start a School of Biblical Studies, Jos, back in 1989, (Wow, that was 35 years ago) we decided on two major goals for the future of the school. First, each student would receive an excellent education in Bible, and how to present its contents effectively to the church. Second, was each student would actively practice evangelism while attending SBS. We wanted our students to see the face of each person they had taught the gospel as they raised them from the watery grave of baptism as described in Romans chapter 6.

Our first goal was to find men and women dedicated to a life of teaching the scriptures and the role of a Christian. In order to obtain an excellent Bible and Language education, we needed to bring men and women, chosen by our African brethren, to America. Our first student was Brother Solomon Aguh and his family. None of the 11 students that followed Brother Solomon and his wife, Rachel, needed four years to complete their Bible Degrees. Some returned later to complete their Master's Degree. **Everyone we brought to America returned to Africa!** Of our present teaching staff of ten men and two women, all have their Master's Degree and four have obtained their PhD, while five are enrolled in their PhD programs in Africa.

Having these brethren visit our country has been an adventure both for them and myself. I am reminded today while looking out my window of one very funny story. One winter morning when I was having coffee in our kitchen, the phone rang. I answered it to hear a voice that was excited and very loud. One of our students from Africa expressed panic as he shouted, **"Brother Worley you must come quickly. The earth has disappeared!"** He repeated it over and over again. As I attempted to calm him down I looked out my window and realized what was his problem. I explained that what he was looking at was snow. Later I convince him that he should try to walk outside. As I write this article I can look out my window here in Savannah, Tennessee, and see six inches of snow with more falling. God is great! **Steve Worley**

SCHOOL REPORTS / CHAD REPUBLIC

Brethren we continue to give glory to God for this great blessing. We have a Primary and a Secondary school along with a Medical Clinic located on our 15 acres of land in the village of Dono-Manga in Southern Chad Republic. There are no paved roads, electricity, or treated water in the area, yet both our schools continue to grow, being supplied with students from 32 villages. Five of our graduates of SBS are from this part of the Chad Republic.

They started the teaching of our local children in the school year 2009 - 2010, with an attendance of 142 students divided into 2 classrooms with 3 teachers. Since our beginning, our Lord continues to bless this work beyond measure. Our Primary School now has 939 children registered! The school campus consists of 15 classrooms with 20 teachers and other personnel.

Our Secondary School has 430 students being taught in 8 classrooms by 17 teachers and other personnel. This gives us a total of 1,369 students being taught by 37 teachers.

The Churches of Christ in Dono - Manga and surrounding villages are still growing, but there are many challenges, especially during the Rainy Season. We will continue to give glory to God who continues to allow us to add more souls to the body of Christ. In September 2023, 8 people obeyed the Lord's command, being immersed, and added to the body of Christ (see the pictures below) plus we witnessed 45 restorations.

We wish to remind you about the construction of the security wall around the rest of the campus. We have already gathered the materials necessary for the foundation, but we had to stop because of the heavy rain and the need to harvest our farms. The plan is made to come back in early February, Lord willing. We also need money to purchase used clothing for our children as most come for very poor families. We are still requesting for the eventual visit of Brother Steve Worley visit to Chad Republic and Dono - Manga
