Families attended from many states in Nigeria to watch their sons or daughters graduate. Thirty students, which included six women, completed their chosen program of studies. Five students graduated with certificates in our Extension Training Programs at Kaltungo, Gombe State, and Makurdi, Benue State. An elder, Jack Horton with the Gadsden Church of Christ, which is our overseeing eldership, gave our Commencement Address. One other speaker said to our graduates, "Today you are joining an exclusive group of over 600 dedicated Christians who have graduated from this institution. Men and women who, under the leadership of Brother Naphtali Dagasamah, converted over 13,000 people on our Weekend Evangelism Program. A group that includes Brother Nkem, who has served as a Nigerian missionary to Uganda for over 16 years under Nigerian oversight and support. A group of 40 foreign students who returned home after they graduated SBS. Please remember you are our representatives now. When people see you, they see us. MAKE US PROUD of you as we see or hear of your future faithfulness and service to our Lord Jesus."

OUR POULTRY TRAINING PROGRAM

One of our goals for many years was to add a Poultry Training Program to our Agricultural Department at SBS. We have the Drip Irrigation Training, Fish Farming, Grass Cutter Rearing, and Citrus Programs headed by Brother Bala Turgong and his staff of men and women serving their year of service in the National Youth Service Corp. Dr. Tom Udoh, our president, has raised chickens at his home here in Jos for over 15 years. He is willing and able to provide us with the expertize we need to make this program a success. Our goal is to provide our students with the knowledge and practical training to teach our brethren and the lost a means of feeding their families along with a richer knowledge of God's word.

On May 28, 2019, we received two hundred and fifty chickens. Fifty broilers and two hundred layers. We put them in one room of the new three-room building we recently constructed. Because of the cooler weather during the Rainy Season, we had to put charcoal heaters in the brooding room. The four rows of five-inch security spikes welded to angle iron and cemented to the tops of our cement block security walls was installed just days before. These measures plus two watch dogs and a night watch should be enough to ensure our new guests will grow to lay many eggs to help our program increase. We thank you for your prayers and support that enabled us to reach this long-awaited goal.



A VISIT TO EAST AFRICA

While Dr. Solomon Aguh went to represent SBS at a graduation in Liberia, I traveled to Uganda to represent SBS at the 4th graduation ceremony and 10th anniversary of the Uganda Christian Bible College at Jeeja. After a few days in Kampala, I traveled north to Kigumba, then to the college which is located about a mile south of the city.

There I met Brother Rhone Anguaza, who is President of UCBC, along with many of the graduates of SBS at Jos. The graduation ceremony took place on a field in the middle of the campus. They had provided tents and seating for all the officials and invited guests. The local King could not attend due to pressing business, but he sent his wife as his representative.

Twelve students graduated while seventeen students continued with their studies. Six of the seventeen students are from the country of South Sudan. Brother David Bates along with Brother Patrick Sisk were in Uganda hosting a gospel meeting. Brother Bates presented a sermon at the ceremony.

While sitting in the field watching the graduates march past to receive their Certificates or Diplomas, it was hard for me to realize that it has been ten years since Solomon and I visited Uganda and I became sick with Malaria. I lay in bed for a week while Solomon and Rhone traveled north to Kigumba to negotiate and purchase the land I was setting on. For over twenty years the elders of the Foote Street Church of Christ in Corinth, Mississippi, had sent men and women from Uganda to Nigeria to obtain their degree in Bible that would enable them to teach at UCBC. I pray Brothers Wayne Henry and Wayne McApin, of Corinth, Mississippi, will receive a "Well Done" from our Lord Jesus Christ for this great work.
